Project AKTION 71p4 – History of Mass Housing of Czechoslovakia and Austria

The project "History of Mass Housing of Czechoslovakia and Austria" supported by AKTION has been successfully realized according to the project proposal without major changes or problems. The main body of the project – an international symposium and field trip – was realized in April and May 2015. Symposium tilted "Housing the Masses" with the subtitle "International Conference on the History of Institutionalized Housing of Socialist Czechoslovakia and Austrian Welfare State" took place at the conference hall of the Moravian Gallery in Brno, the Museum of Applied Arts on 28 April 2015. Three speakers from Austria and three speakers from the Czech Republic respectively delivered their lectures on the topic of institutionalized housing in both countries. See the annexe A for the details.

The field trip took place in the cities of Brno, Ostrava, Zlín and Vienna between 29 April and 3 May 2015. Nine students and one scholar from Austria and seven students and three scholars (organizational team) visited representative housing estates documenting evolution of institutionalized housing in the first and second half of the 20th century in Austria and former Czechoslovakia. Visit of each location was accompanied by local expert commentary and guidance. See the annexe B for the details.

Both the symposium and the field trip were highly beneficial to participating students and teachers in terms of education and acquiring information that was previously unavailable to them due to the language barrier and insufficient English literature on the topic. Besides the transfer of the knowledge the form of symposium and the filed trip led to the development of professional connections with serious aim for the further research on the proposed topic. An established online cloud service for the exchange of historical documents and literature can serve as an evidence of the early stage of possible future cooperation. The symposium was also open to the general public and was attended by students and scholars from other universities. This was also beneficial in terms of broadening the contacts even further.

The changes made in the proposed budget and the programme of the project were mainly due to the decrease of the initial funding (applied for 134 920,- Kč / obtained 115 000,- Kč) and the availability of proposed speakers and accompanying experts at the time of the realization of the project. Nevertheless, the project was fully realized in high quality in terms of organization, logistics, professional speakers and expert guides and relevance of the topics. The available budget of 115 000,- Kč was slightly reorganized in order to fulfil the proposed scenario of the project in an appropriate quality. The main savings in finance concerned bus transportation (received 29 900,- Kč / spent 18 127,- Kč) and accommodation costs (received 33 880,- Kč / spent 22 490,- Kč) to be reinvested in more urgent items such as renting of the conference hall (5 000,- Kč), simultaneous translation to English for symposium speaker Michaela Janečková (8 470,- Kč) and graphic design of related project presentation (posters, invitations, web etc., 11 325,71 Kč). Renting of the properly sized, technically equipped representative conference hall, which is not available at the moment within the spatial options of the Faculty of Fine Arts BUT, was essential for the accommodation of broader public to the conference. This was also beneficial in terms of overall impact of the conference and widening the scope of participating professionals in the audience. It led to the broadening of the professional contacts as well. Part of the saved finances enabled us to provide architect Janečková with simultaneous translation of her lecture including necessary audio technics, which increased quality of her speech. The topic of early prefabrication delivered in Mrs. Janečková lecture was crucial to the conference programme. The rest of the saved finance was mainly reinvested in the decreased budget on the "Publishing and editorial expenses" in order to promote the whole event accordingly on a professional level.

Based on the consultation with the Department of Transportation of the Brno University of Technology (Pavel Brtník) the savings on transportation were achieved by hiring a bus for the second day (Ostrava) and third day (Zlín) of the field trip only. Later, during the stay in Vienna, the participants depended on

public transportation. Use of the independent bus in the city of Vienna was uneconomical due to the parking and emission fees and costly accommodation of the driver. The Czech participants left Vienna for Brno with a regular cross-border bus service ran by the Student Agency company at the end of the trip. The savings on accommodation were achieved by reduced prices for students and academic stuff at the student residences in Zlín.

All changes were approved by the higher faculty management as necessary or beneficial for the realization of the project.



SPEAKERS:

ROMAN KRAKOVSKY (France/Slovakia) is a historian and anthropologist with main focus on societies and authoritarian regimes in Contemporary Central and Eastern Europe. In 2012, he received his PhD in history at Sorbonne University (Paris, France). His work is devoted to the analysis of time and space frames in Communist Czechoslovakia was awarded with several distinctions including Prix d'histoire sociale of Fondation de la Maison des sciences de l'homme (Paris, 2013). The Fraenkel Prize in Contemporary History of the Wiener Li-brary (London, 2013) and Accessit Thesis Prize of Fondation Varenne (Paris, 2014), which was published in 2014 at Publications de la Sorbonne (Réinventer le monde. L'espace et le temps en Tchécoslovaquie comuniste).

Since 2013, he has held several research position such as the Visiting Fellow at CERI, Sciences Po/CNRS (Paris, France), Po-st-doc Research Fellow at Labex Tepsis, EHESS (Paris, France) and Visiting Research Fellow at Aleksanteri Institute, Centre for Russian and East European Studies, University of Helsinki (Helsinki, Finland). Since 2005, he has been tecturing at the Institute of Political Sciences (Paris, France) and since 2013 at the Global Studies Institute, University of Geneva. MICHAELA JANECKOVA (Czech Republic) is an architecture the origins. HUBERT GUZIK (Czech Republic:/Poland) is an architectural historian. He graduated from the Warsaw University and Charles University in Prague. His main areas of research are the history of zoth century architecture in sociological context and feminist and gender architectural criticism. He has been an assistant professor at the Faculty of Architecture at Czech Technical University in Prague since 2009, In 2014, he published a book Four Paths to the Koldüm: Collective Housing as an Example of the Ultrois in the Czech Architecture; 1000–1008. an Example of the Utopia in the Czech Architecture, 1900-1989 (in Czech).

MICHAEL KLEIN (AUSTIA) is an architect and researcher based in Vienna, Austria. He studied architecture at the Vienna University of Technology and the ESA Paris and graduated from the Academy of fine Arts Vienna in 2007. Since then, he has been working in the field


WALTER MATZNETTER (Austria)

Besides that he also published texts on social housing in Vienna/Austria, housing and welfare regimes, comparative urban studies, European cities and globalization and international student migration. His main fields of research are urban geography (in particular the institutional approach of research), qualitative methods (in particular the narrative interview) and "New Cultural Geography."

MICHAEL ZINGANEL (Austria)

is an architecture theorist, cultural historian, curator and artist. He obtained a PhD in contemporary history at the University of Vienna and was teaching at the Institute of Building Typology at the Graz University of Technology and at various other uni-versities and academies, including postgraduate programme of Bauhaus Dessau Foundation and most recently Academy of Fine arts in Vienna.

Among other projects he realized a touring exhibition through common amenities in Viennese municipal buildings of the inter-war-period. Vienna in 1995, a show about the history of anonymous single family houses in post-war Austria for AzW Vienna in 1998 and diverse formats about the productive force of crime for the development of art, architecture and urforce of crime for the development of art, architecture and ur-ban design. eg. 




